BACKGROUND

September 13, 2007 the United Nations (UN) adopted the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP). The vote was almost unanimous with Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the United States voting against the declaration. The approval was based on the recommendation of the United Nations Human Rights Council.

The Commission on Truth and Reconciliation, Article #43 calls on all levels of government to adopt and implement UNDRIP. The adoption and implementation has been haphazard across the country with Canada passing the legislation June 21, 2021 and immediately receiving Royal Assent.

UNDRIP has 46 articles covering a broad array of human rights including the right to the full enjoyment, as a collective or as individuals, of all human rights and fundamental freedoms as recognized in the Charter of the United Nations, the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and international human rights law to self-determination to maintenance of their distinct institutions to spirituality and more.

COMMENT

UNDRIP is about basic human rights with no direct consequences for municipalities other than to respect the rights of indigenous peoples, consult with them and partner with them if the opportunity arises. However, there is an obligation to partner with indigenous peoples through "free, prior and informed consent." (FPIC)

FPIC is about working together in partnership and respect. In many ways, it reflects the ideals behind the relationship with Indigenous peoples, by striving to achieve consensus as parties work together in good faith on decisions that impact Indigenous rights and interests. Department of Justice UNDRIP Act Summary

A tool to accomplish FPIC is a relationship agreement outlining how and when municipalities and the local indigenous groups may work. The Sacichawasihc Relationship Agreement is an

example of how to develop those relationships leading to effective partnerships addressing a variety of issues and opportunities.

BACKGROUND

The issue of speeding on Inglewood Drive was studied back in 2018 at which time Council passed the following motion:

INGLEWOOD DRIVE SPEED STUDY - FINAL REPORT PREPARED BY PETER ALLABY, P. ENG., CRANDALL ENGINEERING LTD.

Councillor Evans moved to proceed with the recommendations provided by Peter Allaby, P. Eng., Crandall Engineering Ltd. regarding Inglewood Drive Speed Study with the exception of Item #2:

Item #1: It is recommended that the Town install two additional 40 Km/h speed limit signs on Inglewood Drive to reinforce the speed limit. The recommendation locations are northbound near Civic #209 and southbound near Civic #256.

Item #3: It is recommended that the Town keep vegetation trimmed back at curves on the roadway to maintain good sight lines and visibility.

Seconded by Councillor Day. Carried.

COMMENT

Additional speed signs have been installed per recommendation 1 and annually the Town trims the corners to improve sight lines per recommendation 3.

To implement recommendation 2, to install a white shoulder line on the east side of Inglewood Drive the following activities need to occur. The recently painted Sharrow symbols need to be blacked out. The existing white line and yellow line also need to be blacked out allowing new lines to be painted to reflect the 1.5m shoulder and 3.0m driving lane. The sharrow symbols on the west side of Inglewood are no longer required and can be allowed to fade and wear off.

Going forward the Sharrow symbols no longer need to be painted annually. The Share the road sign can stay or can be removed.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Per the current tender price for pavement markings both a single solid yellow or white line is \$300/km and Inglewood is 2.6 kms in length. There are some unknown costs for painting over the Sharrow symbols and the existing white and yellow lines so they can be repainted in the correct position on the roadway. There are also 48 Sharrow symbols which would no longer be required, resulting in an annual savings of 48 @ \$80, \$3,840 less \$780 for the new single solid white line.

The contractor for pavement marking has advised the price to paint the line black is \$0.90 per foot. 2.6km for the white line and 2.6km for the yellow line translate into 17,060 ft at \$0.90 equals \$15,354. Plus the painting of the sharrow symbols.

The contractor will be asked not to paint the yellow and white lines on Inglewood Drive this year to allow them to fade more before the new lines at painted next year.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Council authorize staff to implement Recommendation No. 2 in the Final Report – Inglewood Drive Speed Study November 13, 2018 in 2022 when pavement marking are applied to reflect 1.5m wide shoulder on both the east and west side and the driving lane be reduced in width to 3.0m, allowing for additional budget funding to be requested in 2022 to paint the sharrow symbols and the first time marking out of the new pavement markings alignment.

BACKGROUND

The Town currently has one credit card. The card is used by all of the departments. With the new procurement policy the Town will be using more credit cards. The purpose of the Credit Card Policy is to outline the responsibilities and expectations of the Town of Grand Bay-Westfield credit card holders.

COMMENT

The policy applies to all employees of the Town who are granted and assigned a corporate credit card. The conditions set forth in this policy govern the responsible use of, and procedures for, credit cards belonging to the Town of Grand Bay-Westfield for the purpose of conducting Town business.

The majority of business expenses under \$5,000, which cannot be invoiced to the Town, are to be purchased by the cardholder and paid for with the corporate credit card.

Cardholders are responsible for ensuring that they adhere to this Corporate Credit Card Policy in order to enforce adequate controls to minimize the risk of corporate credit cards being used for fraudulent purposes.

Should an employee not comply with the policy then discipline may include all actions up to and including termination.

Each department head is expected to sign Schedule "A" acknowledging that they have read and understand the policy.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The change is expected to be neutral: no new revenue or expenses.
