#### **BACKGROUND**

Since 2011 Joe Oliver has been lobbying on behalf of the property owner, Catherine (Cathy) Oliver to build on Lot #4 Robbin Ct. To date they have increased the elevation of Lot #4 Robbin Ct.

#### COMMENT

The Town has consistently communicated with the Oliver's that a road needs to be constructed for a building permit to be issued. The CAO even had the Town's Solicitor send a letter with the same message.

Mr. Oliver has proposed three possible solutions.

- 1. Extend the driveway to the end of the existing asphalt.
  - a. This option is not feasible because of the need for emergency vehicles to access the property.
  - b. For snow removal purposes on Robbin Ct.
  - c. The property owner does not own the land the driveway would be built on; it is Town Right-of-Way (R-o-W)
- 2. The Town extend Robbin Ct. with gravel.
  - a. This option does not meet Town road standards.
  - b. The cost would be at Town expense and is estimated to cost more than \$200,000 per the R-o-W.
  - c. The Town offered to accept a road that is not the full length of the R-o-W provided it is built by the developer per the Zoning Bylaw 4.3:

#### 4.3 Utilities And Infrastructure

This By-law prohibits the erection of any building in respect of which, in the opinion of Council, satisfactory arrangements have not been made for the supply of electric power, water, sewerage, street or other services or facilities.

- d. Final Approvals are still awaiting a digital file to be submitted to Dillon for review concerning slopes and extent of the new fill required to construct a shortened public street, suggested to be about 20 m along the frontage of their lot, resulting in extending the public street by approx. 40 m overall. Applications for variances have provide relief for lot frontages of 20 m for specific circumstances. In this case Council would be making this decision based on recommendations from staff and Dillon Consulting, based on the proximity to the wetlands.
- 3. Restoration of Robbin Ct.: combine Option #1 and #2 until the Town can construct a new public roadway.
- a. Road construction is the responsibility of the developer, not the Town.

  Regarding the email from Mr. Pelkey dated 2011 and who has since retired: regarding

  Watercourse and Wetland Alteration Permit: there is no permit or permission from Environment except they state that

"provided that the portion ... is outside the 30m regulated buffer...you are exempt from the requirement to obtain a Watercourse and Wetland Alteration Permit."

It should also be noted that the regulations have changed since 2011.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

Currently, Developers are responsible for developing public roadways. The cost for the Town to develop the remaining portion of Robbin Ct. is estimated to be more than \$200,000. Further, other property owners on undeveloped roadways may ask for the same privilege resulting in significant future costs due to precedence.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Two lots remain as vacant lots beyond the extent of the paved street on Robbin Court. At that time the Subdivision was approved in 1971 it was outside of the limits of the Village of Westfield and therefore Approved by the Province. The Developer did not complete the infrastructure required to service all the lots, however, as a condition of extension of Village boundary limits in 1976 the Province completed paving streets in front of all existing homes. Vacant lots beyond serviced portions of these streets remained UNDEVELOPED. Other examples are still found at the end of Douglas Street, Mallard Drive, and Sunnyside Drive. Other Subdivisions registered as early as the beginning of the 20th century either did not provide public access and services and remain undeveloped.

#### **COMMENT**

Definition of developer: A real estate developer is an entity or person who improves raw land. Real estate developers undertake an entrepreneurial role in creating the built environment in response to the needs of the community and the market.

A Developer can create new lots by constructing new Public Streets. A developer can also develop lots whether it is a single home or larger commercial property. In the case of a singlefamily dwelling a homeowner may act as the developer.

#### **BACKGROUND**

In April of 2005 a Traffic and Pedestrian Study was conducted along River Valley Drive. One of the recommendations was to follow up on Future Levels of Service: this was a review of the need for a left turn lane at River Valley Drive and Epworth Park Road. The review was included in the 2021 Transportation Budget to determine if traffic warrants had changed.

#### **COMMENT**

The proposed intersection re-alignment for a left turn lane is included in our 5 Year Designated Highway Plan and scheduled for 2024, see attached Designated Highway 5 Year Plan. The intersection review was included in the 2021 Transportation Budget to determine if traffic warrants had changed. If the study provided confirmation the warrants were met, engineering could occur in anticipation of receiving funding in coming years.

With the warrants still not being met since 2005, the intersection will not need a re-alignment in the foreseeable future, unless there is a major change which would impact vehicle patterns and volumes. This is not anticipated as most of the land east and west of River Valley Drive accessed from Epworth Park Road is already developed.

#### **BACKGROUND**

On August 19, 2021 a request was received from a resident inquiring how one would get a stop sign installed as she has been experiencing some near misses at the intersection of Bayview Road and Beach Road.

#### COMMENT

The request was sent to our Traffic Consultants to review the intersection to determine how it conforms to TAC (Transportation Association of Canada). The recommendation is that a Stop sign be installed.

The installation of a NEW stop sign will also the require an amendment to our Traffic By-Law No. 80 to include the new stop control in Schedule "B" which lists all the stop intersections in the Town.

By-law Officer, David Taylor advises the procedure for adding the stop intersection is to forward a draft by-law to the Motor Vehicle Register for approval before going to Council for 1st, 2nd and 3rd readings.

Upon passing of the by-law amendment the stop sign will be installed. Note, as this approval may not occur until winter and the ground is frozen, the post will be installed within the next month in anticipation of the bylaw approval. This allows the stop sign to be attached to the existing post once approval is received.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The cost for installing a new stop sign and post is estimated at \$400 which includes labor, equipment, and materials.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Council concur with the recommendation of Jill DeMerchant P.Eng, Transportation Engineer with Englobe that a stop sign on Bayview Road approach to Beach Road be installed to improve intersection overall safety and direct staff to proceed to enact an amendment to Traffic By-Law No. 80 to add the intersection of Bayview Road onto Beach Road/Ash Glen Lane as a stop intersection.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Twice each year grant applications are received per Policy \*A006. The intake dates are April 30<sup>th</sup> and September 30<sup>th</sup>. Each year \$1 per resident per the previous Census is set aside for grants for a total of \$4,964.

#### A brief summary of the applications:

- 11 applications
- Total funding requests \$4,538.02
- Grant money available is \$2,714
- The largest ask was \$1,500
- The smallest was \$126
- One request did not specify an amount
- Local schools submitted 6 applications

#### Some policy highlights:

- ...generally, no grants shall be made to other than registered charitable organizations,
- ...no grants shall be made to teams and individuals travelling to sanctioned age-class tournaments, or other events excepting national or international events of importance
- ...generally, Council will not consider submissions that are the responsibility of other levels of government.

#### **COMMENT**

Most of the applications do not qualify for funding as the policy as written. However, the policy is clear that grants shall be awarded at Council's discretion based on submissions. An example of this is the applications by the schools. They are a government entity and generally, should not be considered. Yet, they receive funding on a regular basis and form the largest application base.

It would be prudent to review the policy and that a scoring matrix be developed for future intakes.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The grant money has been budgeted.
